Dear Friends.

Our community garden behind Phelps House is an oasis of lush green foliage, exquisite flowers, and beautiful strong trees, reaching for the sky. The garden reminds me of Goddard Riverside: welcoming, enduring, and



striving to reach new heights. The garden and those trees, planted and cared for by participants in our programs, are integral to the fabric of our community and so is Goddard Riverside.

Our roots are in the settlement house movement that was born from the commitment of neighbors to work side-by-side fighting for social and economic justice. In 1959, two of these historic settlement houses merged: Riverside Community House, founded in 1887, and Goddard Neighborhood Center, established in 1892. The merger created

Goddard Riverside Community Center.

Today we are a modern-day settlement house with programs on the Upper West Side and in Harlem, while serving the whole of New York City. We work in partnership with residents, schools, other non-profits, businesses, and government at all levels. We share with the early settlement houses a strong value system rooted in social equity, economic opportunity, and citizen participation. Every day in our programs and residences we live out with fervor these same beliefs.

On a personal note, I have been involved with Goddard Riverside since the 5th grade, when I attended my first Goddard Gaieties Dance, a fundraiser that my mother helped plan. It was a square dance and I can still remember exactly what I wore. As an adult, I was part of a group that founded another event to raise funds – the Goddard Riverside Musical Evenings, presenting concerts in private homes. Both the Gaieties and the Musical Evenings continue to this day.

More than 45 years ago, in 1968, I joined the Goddard Riverside Board of Directors. I'm just one of many people throughout our history with a deep and decades-long personal involvement. This speaks to who we are: rooted and reaching for the stars.

I am honored to lead this wonderful Board of Directors and invite you to read about our many accomplishments in the past year.



REACHING FOR EXCELLENCE

OPTIONS

 Our Options college access and success program is a leader in the movement to increase the number of low-income young people who graduate from college.

FORGING BOLD NEW APPROACHES

- The U.S. Department of Education and the White House have called on Options to join other experts in meetings and planning at the national level.
- To achieve systemic change in New York City schools,
 Options is partnering with the Department of Education to train at least one staff member in every City high school on college access. A professional research team is evaluating our training model in order to establish its validity with hard data.
- Our continuum of children's and youth programming is developing a college-going culture featuring strategies such as peer leadership and academic supports.

CAPITOL HALL RESIDENCE

- We are completing a \$16.6 million renovation to Capitol Hall, one of our four supportive housing residences.
- The structure of the refinancing is unique among not-forprofit supportive housing preservation projects – a model for the use of tax exempt bond financing, low income housing tax credits, and both federal and city subsidies.
- The renovation has transformed a historic single room occupancy building into a new, modern residence with private bathrooms and kitchenettes.



BREAKING DOWN SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC BARRIERS

MANHATTAN OUTREACH CONSORTIUM

- Led by Goddard Riverside, the Manhattan Outreach Consortium
 has a third three-year contract with the City to be the central
 agency accountable for all people living on the streets of
 Manhattan.
- Since the inception of the Manhattan Outreach Consortium in late 2007, the number of chronically homeless individuals placed in permanent housing is 1,313 and the one-year retention rate for those placed is 94%.
- According to the annual HOPE street survey, the number of homeless individuals living in public places in Manhattan has decreased by 55% over the last nine years.

CREATING POWERFUL PARTNERSHIPS

EXEMPLARY COLLABORATIONS

Goddard Riverside partners with 17,000 program participants; 1,000 volunteers; over 400 staff; 60 foundations; 48 Board members; 15 government agencies – many with multiple contracts; hundreds of schools, other non-profits, and businesses; thousands of individual and corporate donors; and countless other neighborhood residents.

BEING THOUGHT LEADERS IN THE FIELD

OLDER ADULT SERVICES

- Nourish FIRST, a two-year research project conducted with the Center for Long Term Care Research and Policy at New York Medical College, fills a gap in information about homebound elders.
- It documents the level of food security, health, independent living status, and social service needs of 500 frail elderly individuals. The findings substantiate critical unmet needs related to chronic illness, functional impairment, hunger, and social services.
- Goddard Riverside is disseminating the study results and initiating discussions about policy implications for the growing population of older New York City residents.



CELEBRATING LIFE THROUGH THE ARTS

COMMUNITY ARTS PROGRAM

- We are becoming a new cultural hub on the Upper
 West Side, made possible by the 2011 renovation of the
 performance space at our Bernie Wohl Center. Over 80
 events during the year run the gamut from Shakespearian
 classics and chamber music to hip hop dancing and
 poetry slams.
- The audiences for our film, dance, music, visual arts and theater presentations include adults and young people with little previous exposure to the arts and those who are frequent attendees at cultural events.
- We tie public performances to our children's and youth programs with arts education activities that encourage exploration, awareness, and participation.

STRATEGIC PLAN

- Goddard Riverside is developing a plan to ensure the sustainability of our evolving mission.
- Led by professionals in philanthropic planning, an agencywide process is creating a clear, shared, and agreed-upon set of strategic priorities. Under review are governance, management, communications, human resources, finances, fundraising, and programs.

FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT

- We have our sixth consecutive four-star rating from Charity Navigator, the leading non-profit evaluation organization in the U.S. Four stars indicate exceptional fiscal responsibility and good governance practices.
- Only a small fraction of non-profits receive six or more consecutive four-star ratings, indicating that we are outperforming most other charities in the country.



YOUTHPROMISE CAMPAIGN

- The \$4 million raised to date is being invested in children and teens to open the doors of opportunity through exemplary college readiness and youth development programming.
- Using a strength-based approach, the After School Programs, Options Center, Summer Day Camps, and Star Learning Center create for children from low-income families an environment in which success in the primary and secondary school years paves the way for college graduation.

OUTSTANDING ACHIEVEMENTS

The **2013 Book Fair Gala** honored **Jane Friedman**, Co-Founder and CEO of Open Road Integrated Media, for her leadership in the publishing industry.

At the 2014 Neighbor to Neighbor Awards Dinner, we celebrated Lino Alvarez, Olasimbo "Summy" Fowors, Van L. Harriman, the Interfaith Assembly on Homelessness and Housing, Panim El Panim-Life Skills Empowerment Program, Lynne Sheehan, Nicholas Steele, and Sharon Wilson for their special contributions to our communitu.

The **Board of Directors** held a celebration for **Susan Richman**, a former First Vice President, who stepped down after 27 years of coordinating the Meet-the-Author Dinners. She continues as a member of the Board and Co-Chair of the annual Goddard Riverside Book Fair.

The **Broadway Malls Association** awarded our social purpose horticulture and sanitation business, **Green Keepers**, its **Eugene Hide Award** for helping beautify and maintain the malls from 70th to 168th Streets.


ACT Team. Case management and treatment at home for individuals with serious and persistent mental illness.




FY13 REVENUE


FY13 OVERALL EXPENSES




