Good Neighbor Awards 2022

The Good Neighbor Awards are being presented to the following in recognition of their extraordinary work as volunteers in helping build a better community.

Linda Carter Cooper for promoting and advocating for her community. She has been an Upper West Side staple for over 40 years aiding her neighbors who were experiencing issues with housing, with their child's schools and aiding elderly and/or sick and shut-in individuals. She has cared for many seniors in the neighborhood who lived alone and had no family or friends. She has assisted many UWS residents by advocating for causes including rent stabilization and providing valuable information and support to her neighbors. She has helped countless individuals navigate housing issues and the public school system in NYC.

Mark Diller for long standing service and community leadership. He is a member of Community Board 7, and is a former Board Chair, Co-Secretary, and Co-Chair of various committees and task forces. Mark is also the Manhattan representative on the NYC Civic Engagement Commission. Prior to CB7, Mark was an active education advocate, PTA president and School Leadership Team Co-Chair, a presenter at each Harlem Schools Summit, and frequent parent advocate for greater equity and funding for public schools. Mark also previously harvested leftover produce and baked goods to support a local soup kitchen, and lead grant-writing efforts and fundraising events to support public schools.

LaDreamer Lark (and 8 yr. old daughter Dreamer Daisy)

for their initiatives to support schools and community members during COVID. This powerful mother and daughter duo supported others in the height of the pandemic, by tirelessly assembling care packages with hand sanitizer, re-usable face masks, toothpaste, toothbrush, lotion, and words of encouragement. They sparked a mask distribution drive in February 2021, giving away over 25,000 masks to the community and local small businesses for redistribution. La'Dreamer & Daisy Helping Hands Foundation Inc. has provided children with extracurricular activities and student resources such as homework help, job training, and college application assistance.



"One Block" founded by Ann Cutbill Lenane & Jake Russell

for their focus on maintaining a cleaner Upper West Side. Ann Cutbill Lenane, a broker with Douglas Elliman, started this UWS mammoth block association from the West 70s to West 96th St. to get people to pick up trash and clean in response to the NYC Sanitation Dept their budget cut from 3 times weekly emptying street corner trash baskets to twice a week. This effort has engaged a whole host of community volunteers thereby connecting neighbors to make a huge difference.

LeVera Sutton for her extraordinary devotion to community organizing through advocacy and building relationships and connections. LeVera has worked with a community tenant committee from her Harlem SRO supporting work for stronger rent and eviction protections--and for a "Right to Counsel" for tenants in housing court; she has been a spokesperson and leader on behalf of all SRO tenants. She consistently engages other people to learn about their rights as tenants and refers people to Goddard Riverside and other organizations that can assist them.

Alan Winson for his passion for the community and podcasting. For many years Alan has had an impact through podcasts addressing social issues and activism. Connecting the arts to the community, bringing to the for front topics of social impact, and most recently bringing people together during the lockdown and through the pandemic. During the lockdown Alan felt the need to connect with artists who could no longer work since all their venues had closed. He created the podcast 'Hunkered Down' for which he interviewed actors and musicians. In his interviews he encouraged them to talk about their work, helped them connect to their sense of purpose and helped keep the creative world alive.
